Overview of General Barriers to FDI in Hungary:

Regulatory barriers and administrative burden are affecting all sectors but particularly energy, construction, and banking: The overall administrative burden, including start-ups, negatively affects investment decisions. The instability of the regulatory framework, with frequent and unpredictable regulatory changes, creates uncertainty for investors and is hindering both internal investment and FDIs.

The Hungarian government imposes a 100% offset requirement for defined sector investments over HUF 1bln (EUR 2.8 mln). Efficiency of procedures in construction and environmental permits is insufficient; corruption also raises risk for investors. There is no requirement that investors must purchase from local sources, but the EU Rules of origin applies.

Ownership restrictions (all non-EU)

according to the 2014 Land Law, only private Hungarian or EU citizens resident in Hungary with a minimum of three years experience of working in agriculture or holding degree in agriculture can purchase farmland, which is limited to 300 hectares. All others may lease farmland. All farmland purchases must be approved by a local land committee and Hungarian authorities, local farmers and young farmers must be offered a chance to purchase the land first. Up to 1200 hectares for a maximum of 20 years may be leased.

Price controls in consumer facing sectors and others considered to be of strategic importance.

The Hungarian government regulates the prices of certain goods, setting the upper and lower limits to which the private sector must adhere. Sectors include energy, pharmaceuticals. Cuts on regulated utilities prices have put considerable pressure on private utilities companies, decreasing profit margins and adding to an increasingly difficult operating environment.

State intervention in Banking, energy, agriculture, media, telecommunications, and retail sectors.

Since 2012 government has invested in state-owned enterprises with the objective of lessening the participation of foreign-owned competitors, especially in the energy sector. From 1 Jan 2019, the chemical industry, the telecom sector, vehicle construction, metallurgy, optics and electric equipment production, the defence industry, water and sewage management, the financial sector, food industry and agriculture, production of construction materials, state administration, health care, wage management, transport and tourism sectors have been added. Foreign investors in the targeted sectors have expressed concerns that the tax regime has become unpredictable and the additional levies appear to have been aimed against some industries with a high level of foreign ownership.

Basic Rules of The Protection of Strategic assets Concerning Foreign investments

The European Commission has issued Communication 2020/C 99 i/01 in which it has given guidance to the Member States of the EU concerning the protection of Europe's strategic assets from the foreign direct investment, ahead of the application of Regulation (EU) 2019/452 (FDI Screening Regulation) which is applicable from 11 October 2020.Commission Delegated Regulation (EU) 2020/1298 of 13 July 2020 amended the Annex to Regulation (EU) 2019/452.

Hungary first adopted FDI screening mechanisms by act LVII of 2018 for FDIs violating the security interests of the country, then in the economic crisis caused by COVID-19, further screening rules were adopted for FDIs by Government Decree nr. 227/2020. (V.25.). According to the above, certain transactions concerning Hungarian-seated companies operated in strategic sectors by foreign investors shall be reported to the Minister of Finance and the acknowledgement of the Minister of Finance is necessary for the realisation of the acquisition of the shares until 31 December 2020. These transactions include the acquisition of shares, the increase of the registered capital and the transformation of the company. The strategic sectors specified by the Government Decree include energy, communication, finance, agriculture and food industry, healthcare, construction, transport industry, tourism, IT, mechanical engineering, etc. Those foreign investors that have shares in a company registered in the EU, European economic Community or in Switzerland shall only report the transaction if majority interest will be acquired indirectly. Conversely, the foreign investors wishing to acquire shares in a Hungarian company directly have to report any transactions by which the foreign investor would acquire shares at a ratio of at least 10% and the value of the investment is at least 350 000 000 HUF (appx EUR 1 mln). The Minister of Finance has 45 days or in specific and duly justified cases 60 days to decide on the acknowledgement of the transaction. Should the Minister provide a negative decision, then the exact reason of the prohibition is not required to be mentioned. Aggrieved investor may appeal before The metropolitan Court for a review of the prohibiting decision.

Banking, agriculture, defence and energy

The Hungarian government has publicly declared that reducing foreign bank market share in the Hungarian financial sector and tightening regulations governing NGOs are key priority areas. Several state-led initiatives over the past several years targeted the banking sector and reduced foreign participation.

1. Inflation rose to 4.0% yr/yr in May, up from 3.7% in April, according to the Central Statistics Office (KSH). Compared to the previous month, prices dropped by 0.1%. Price of sugar soared by 29.6%, eggs by 22%, flour by 19.6%, dairy products cost 11.6% more, the price of cocoa and chocolate rose by 9.8%. Fruits and vegetables increased by 9.5% more, bread by 9%, poultry by 6%. Fuel prices increased by 9.2%. Household energy became 2.4% cheaper, including a 4.7% drop for pipeline gas and a 2.9% drop for electricity. Core inflation – excluding energy and seasonal foods – reached 4% yr/yr in May, down from 4.1% in April. On a monthly basis, core inflation was up 0.5% from April. The average inflation over the first five months was 3.7% yr/yr.

2. Government is abolishing mandatory discounts on food products at big supermarkets from July 1, but the price-monitoring system will remain in place, the Economy Ministry announced. Under the scheme introduced in June 2023 in an effort to bring down inflation, retailers must regularly offer discounts of up to 15% on several food products. The ministry said the mandatory discounts had achieved their goal of bringing down inflation and created strong competition among retailers. Real wages have been rising since September, which has contributed to higher spending by households, fueling economic recovery. The online price-monitoring platform, which compares prices of products, will remain in place. Food prices are no longer the main driver of inflation, but have increased by more than 75% since 2020, making them the fastest-rising product category.

3. IMF recommends that the government carry out reforms to improve the budget balance, promote the green transition and manage long-term risks, after completing its annual evaluation of Hungary's economy on 21 June. The report says that development of a growth-friendly and credible budget adjustment plan and supporting the MNB in reducing inflation should be prioritized. Market conditions are worsened by subsidised loan schemes and an excessively high share of state ownership in key sectors. On tax matters, the IMF writes that instead of special corporate taxes, a better policy would be a higher general tax rate and restructured tax incentives. A flat VAT rate would boost efficiency with fewer brackets and simplified administration, and that a higher tax rate on higher incomes would increase revenues and make the system fairer. The IMF also recommends the introduction of a general property tax. The report forecasts real GDP growth of 2.3% this year and 3.3% in 2025 and inflation up to 4.2% in Q4, dropping to 3% in 2026. Delays in addressing fiscal imbalances and structural policy challenges can undermine investor confidence and hold back private investment, the IMF warned.

Government buys Budapest Airport (EUR 3.1 bln)	After more than a year of intense negotiations, the owners of Budapest Airport reached an agreement to sell the facility operator to the Hungarian state for EUR 3.1 bln, the Economy Ministry announced. Under the agreement, the state will acquire an 80% stake, and French company Vinci will acquire 20% in the airport operator. The largest shareholder in Budapest Airport was Germanys AviAlliance with a 55.4 percent stake. The deal also includes an agreement with a creditor consortium on the extension of an EUR 1.4 bln loan taken out by the previous owners.
2	Liberty Dunaújváros plans layoffs	Liberty Dunaújváros is reorganising the work schedule of the 1,200 employees of Duna Furnace Dunai Vasmu. Some workers will work in two shifts (instead of three) but some will be laid off, although this does not necessarily mean a dismissal according to analysts. Liberty said earlier that the company is going through a transitional period. Experts also recall, that an electric furnace was also planned to be installed in the future, for restarting steel production. The new owner claims that the current slowdown is only a temporary situation.
3	Aircraft maker Magnus to build Chinese factory	Hungarian-owned light aircraft manufacturer Magnus Aircraft is set to start production at its new Chinese base in Wuxi in 2025, the company announced. The 210,000m2 production facility, built in an industrial park, will be ready by October. Additionally, a 1,500m2 showroom will open displaying the entire product range. Magnus Aircraft, founded in 2011, employs 80 people at its manufacturing base in Pogany, near Pecs, and has 22 employees at its subsidiaries in the US, Kenya, Nigeria, Iran, and China. The company said it plans to produce more than 30 Fusion aircraft this year. Magnus Aircraft expects to turn out several thousand two and four-seater aircraft within ten years, mainly for the Chinese market, but also targeting the African and US markets.
4	TDK expands in Szombathely (EUR 65.8 mln)	Japanese electronics company TDK has completed a Ft 26 bln (appx EUR 65.8 mln) expansion programme in Szombathely, Foreign Affairs and Trade Minister Peter Szijjarto said. The government aided the creation of 250 jobs with Ft 6.7 bln (appx EUR 17 mln) in aid. FM Szijjarto pointed out that 200 Japanese companies currently operate in Hungary, employing about 30,000 workers.
5	EC blocks state aid for GKN factory	The EC opened an in-depth investigation in October 2022 into the EUR 43.8 mln in state aid to be provided by the government for construction of an automotive components plant by British company GKN Automotive in the northern part of the country. The EC concluded that Hungary had failed to prove that state aid was decisive for the beneficiary to locate its investment in the country, hence it was not in line with EU state aid rules. A statement from Competition Policy Commissioner Margrethe Vestager said regional aid should encourage businesses to continue operating in a disadvantaged area, but Hungary was planning to subsidise the costs of an activity that the company would have carried out in Hungary in any case. GKN completed construction of its factory in Felsozsolca near Miskolc last autumn.

6	EU levies tariffs on Chinese e-cars	The EU will impose lower tariffs on cars imported by Chinese electric vehicle maker BYD, which is building a factory in Hungary, than on its competitors, the EU announced on 12 June. The EU is imposing punitive tariffs of up to 38.1 percent on electric vehicles coming from China, from July 1, claiming that Chinese carmakers benefit from unfair government subsidies. The tariff varies according to the manufacturers degree of co-operation with a recent investigation by the EU. Tariffs of 38.1 percent will be imposed on cars made by SAIC, 20 percent on Geely vehicles, and 17.4 percent on BYD products. Tesla, which operates a gigafactory in China, will face a 21 percent import tariff. EU officials said that Chinese-owned car plants in the EU, including the planned BYD factory in Hungary, were not included in the scope of this investigation, underlining the preferred trade strategy of creating jobs inside the bloc. The government does not agree with the EUs proposed punitive tariffs Economy Minister Marton Nagy said. Instead of restricting competition among manufacturers through punitive tariffs, support and assistance is needed for the European electric vehicle industry to strengthen its competitiveness on a global level. He added that the government is developing an EU- level action plan to accelerate the spread of electric vehicles and enhance competition. The European Round Table for Industry, which also includes the largest European car manufacturers, does

SS(COM&HOC) and SS(POL&CONS) had an online video meeting with Hungarian Export Promotion Agenc (Ms. Andrea Nestor, Deputy CEO, Ms. Anette Nagy, International Relations Manager on 25 June 2024 and subsequently called on Mr. Andras Rév, Vice-Chairman, Committee of International Affais, and Mrs. Flora Palmay, Director of International Department Hungarian Chamber of Commerce and Industry on 26th June to discuss the upcoming JCEC (to be held in middle of 2025 in New Delhi) and the possible areas of cooperation with EPCs.

Following was mentioned:

-After the Covid-19 pandemic there were only limited interaction regarding the JCEC.

-HEPA has approached many EPCs but received limited response. It was mentioned that the HCCI would be the point of contact for exporters from India to Hungary, while the HEPA primarily represents Hungarian exporters to India.

It was agreed that in order to effectively enhance bilateral ties, first a few specific fields I.e (agriculture, water management, food processing, pharma, engineering, smart cities, automotive, energy (waste-to-energy, biomass), need to be initially focused on by the partners.

-HEPA is ready to jointly receive visiting delagations with HCCI and Hungarian Investment Promotion Agency (HIPA). -An Indian multi-sector delegation would be welcome, after which a Hungarian delegation could visit India.

-Hungary has sizeable Chinese investments in the EV sector, and there is untapped potential for Indian investments also.

1. More guest workers coming from Philippines and Vietnam: Many foreigners work in car and battery factories in Hungary, and more and more are coming here from Asia, the Central Bank (MNB) said. It found that foreign workers play an increasingly important role in the Hungarian labour market, estimating their number in Hungary at 100,000. The majority appx 20,000, come from Ukraine. However, Asia plays a growing role, as the proportion of guest workers from that continent rose from 18.5% in 2019 to 41%. Slovakia and Romania are no longer the second and third most important despatching countries but the Philippines and Vietnam with 9,400 and 8,400 workers respectively. The number of Filipinos rose by 139% and that of Vietnamese by 110% in a single year. The MNB notes that 39,000 of the foreigners work in some processing industries, nearly 10,000 in the automotive industry and 5,000 are employed by companies making electric devices. This category includes battery factory workers as well. There is no danger that the foreigners are taking jobs from Hungarians, as the problem is that it is increasingly difficult for companies to find Hungarians that they could hire. This is not likely to change soon.

2. MNB lowered the base rate by 0.25% to 7%: The slowdown in the monthly rate cuts from 50 basis points to 25 was expected by analysts, as the central bank has repeatedly suggested that the interest rate at the end of the year will not be much lower than at the end of the first half. Observers see only one or two interest rate cuts possible until December, with inflation expected to fluctuate at 4-5%, and the US 10-year bond yield above 4%, it is not feasible for the MNB to cut interest rates further. MNB deputy governor Barnabás Virag said a new era in monetary policy is

beginning as there will be less room for the central bank to cut interest rates for the rest of the year. This means that, in addition to small interest rate cuts, a pause in cuts will also be possible, he added. The external environment narrows the room for manoeuvre, but there are also risks in domestic trends, he said, and the MNB is paying particular attention to strong wage increases and high inflation expectations.

Tariff and Non-Tariff Barriers to Trade:

import Tariffs: The tariff rate on imports averages a comparatively low 1.1% of the value of goods (for international trade), which is the lowest figure regionally and third lowest figure in the whole emerging Europe region. Bosnia's import tariffs are harmonised each year with the combined nomenclature of EU and legislative regulations.

Anti-dumping and countervailing duties: in 2009 Bosnia introduced a law for the protection of domestic products against imports from Croatia and Serbia.

The law stipulates that safeguard measures were necessary owing to the influx of imports and the dumping of particular agricultural products from Croatia and Serbia, as well as a conceivable decrease in exports from Bosnia to Serbia.

Customs and Non-tariff Barriers: as a result of BiH not having EU member status event though the majority of its trading partners are EU member states, export and import supply chains will face more onerous border and documentary times and costs when compared with those of EU states.

The most salient risk is the high cost associated with import border compliance processes, which is higher than that of countries such as North Macedonia and contributes towards Bosnia's status as regional under performer in relation to customs burdens.

Businesses operating in BiH face a high import burden as infrastructural development, industrial capacity and diversification remains weak because of a dearth of fixed capital formation and a lack of political resolve in the country. Imports are driven by the country's need for complex machinery and its energy requirements, such as oil and gas, as well as metals and manufactured goods that cannot be produced locally.

To spur trade, Bosnia has exempted tariff payments from certain equipment that is being imported as part of share capital, with the exceptions of passenger vehicles and slot or gambling machines. To enjoy this benefit, foreign investors must submit a written request to the appropriate customs authority, along with evidence of the investment arrangement and registration of the foreign share. Alternatively, imports into one of Bosnia"s four free trade zones are exempt from customs duties and fees. These zones can be found at Vogosca, Visoko, Mostar and Holc Lukavac and clearly mitigate cost risks for businesses seeking to trade internationally with Bosnia.

Bosnia has applied to join the EU, and accession would open up trade, investment and growth opportunities for the economy. The country has already made good strides in establishing free trade and preliminary agreements to speed up the process of EU accession although, political instability threatens the prospect of EU membership in the medium term. Bosnia is also currently discussing the possibility of the creation of a Western Balkans Customs union with its South eastern-Europe counterparts.

Considerable growth of tourism in Sarajevo Canton: According to data of the Tourist Board (SC) during May 2024, Canton Sarajevo was visited by a total of 71,218 guests who made 138,949 overnight stays, which compared to May 2023 represents an increase of 28.2% in the number of guests, while overnight stays increased by 24.9% Most arrivals were made by foreign tourists from: Turkiye, Croatia, Serbia, China, Germany, USA, Slovenia, United Arab Emirates, Poland and Saudi Arabia. During the four months of 2024, Canton Sarajevo was visited by 234,674 guests, which is 22.9% more than in the same period in 2023. In the Q1 of 2024, the number of overnight stays amounted to 515,556, an increase of 24.8% compared to the same period last year. The positive figures indicate that tourism is growing and could reach new record levels this year.

1. Participation of BiH military industry at fair in Paris: Performance of BiH military industry companies at the international defense and security fair 'Eurosatory 2024' was highly successful for seven BiH companies: Igman Konjic, Unis Ginex Gorazde, Binas Bugojno, Pretis vogosca, Tehnicki remont Bratunac, BNT Machinery and Hydraulics Factory Novi Travnik and AC-Unity Goražde. The values of signed agreements exceed tens of millions of KM. Vedran Lakic FBiH Minister of Energy, Mining and Industry lauded the successful participation of BIH companies and praised the joint performance of all military industry representatives present during the fair. "Dozens of meetings, renewal of agreements and negotiation of new jobs have shown once again that the military industry of Bosnia and Herzegovina has enormous potential and that investment in its development has multiple benefits. Successes at prestigious fairs, talks and new contracts bring with them new jobs that stimulate the development of the economy and provide sources of income for hundreds of families. Eurosatory is the leading international defense and security fair held every two years in Paris. The fair was first held in 1967 and since then has developed into one of the most important events in the defense and security industry. It gathers numerous exhibitors from around the world, including military equipment manufacturers, government agencies, representatives of the armed forces and experts from the security sector.

2. Rating agency Standard & Poor's assigned the Federation of Bosnia and Herzegovina (FBiH) credit rating of B+/B with a stable outlook. "The stable outlook indicates that despite political challenges, the economic recovery will increase fiscal revenues and reduce inflationary pressures, enabling the FBiH to maintain liquidity, achieve projected surpluses and reduce debt, including the debt of public enterprises", S&P Global Ratings said. However, political conflicts within entities and the state are an obstacle to economic growth, and that disagreements are the reason for blocking reform, i.e. slowing down changes. S&P stated that the FBiH economy is relatively poor compared to Eastern European countries and that it also faces significant demographic challenges. One of the biggest problems is the departure of the workforce to other countries. Regardless, gross domestic product (GDP) growth is expected to accelerate to 2-3% per year by 2026, witth inflation to fall below 3% in 2025.
